

Varsity Boys Basketball Team Returns Talent, Experience

The boy's basketball team went through last year's season very inconsistently. The team went into the season expecting to compete for the state championship. The Wildcats started off with a win over rival Millard South and an easy win over Fremont, showing they were going to be a force. They then dropped three straight games and just under halfway through the season, they were a mediocre 5-5. After making a few adjustments, mainly at the point guard position, the 'Cats finished the season 12-2, losing to Omaha Burke in the state semifinals at the Devaney Center in Lincoln. The strong finish by the team left them with high expectations for this coming basketball season.

Experience is going to play a key role in the team's hope for a state championship. Among the eight returning lettermen are three seniors who are also returning starters for the team. Seniors Daniel Bruce, Sean McLaughlin and Adam Steyer should provide the needed leadership this year that the team seemed to be lacking at times last year. Joining them will be juniors Zac Robinson and Scott McLaughlin, who also have starting experience. Other returning lettermen are seniors Jim Eddy and Brian McIntyre and junior Luke Chadwell.

The Wildcats, whose season opens up November 30, with a game against Millard South. Practice starts in mid-November. The team is hoping to once again return to the state playoffs, and improve on their finish the last two years. Last year the team improved to make it to the final four of the state tournament. If this trend continues, the Wildcats will be playing for the State Championship this year.



Curtis Leads Tall Patriot Crew To Win Over Millard West

Millard South's 68-49 Metro Conference boys basketball victory Thursday night over Millard West indicates the Patriots are picking up where the Indians left off last season.

Patriots Coach Larry Ribble brought back all five starters from the final Millard South team known as the Indians, which went 6-7 in its final 13 games to finish 8-13.

"We were close at the end of last year," Ribble said after his first win over former assistant Rick Hook since

the 1996-97 season.

Top 10 No. 8 Millard South's front line, especially in the first quarter and especially with UNO recruit Ryan Curtis for four quarters, was no match for a Wildcat team playing for the first time since 6-foot-9 Kyle Bakker — now playing baseball at Georgia Tech — completed a three-season stay as their inside force.

Curtis had game highs of 24 points, including 12-of-12 shooting on free throws, and 13 rebounds. His first four points came in a 20-5 start for the Patriots in the season-opening game for

both teams.

The doubleheader, which started with Class A No. 10 Millard West's girls routing No. 9 Millard South 56-25, drew a capacity crowd that Millard West Principal Rick Kolowski said was about 1,800.

A University of Nebraska at Omaha assistant coach was in attendance to watch Curtis, one of three 6-7 starters


for the Patriots.

Patrick Bryan, a junior, scored all eight of his points in the first quarter before eventually fouling out. Adam Briley, a senior, had four of his six points on back-to-back baskets that gave the Patriots an early 12-2 lead.

"We played well defensively, but we

"We played well defensively, but we fouled a little too much. It's something to work on," said Ribble, beginning his 23rd season at the school. "The kids know we have to do it on defense."

Junior guard Zac Robinson led the Wildcats with 20 points but made only 7 of 18 shots, and the former age-group free-throw champion was only 5 of 8 at the line. Adam Steyer, a 6-4 senior, had 10 points and a team-high seven rebounds but the other three Wildcat starters combined for five points.

The Wildcats played the first half without Daniel Bruce, a returning starter, for what Hook said was a team


starter, for what Hook said was a team issue. Bruce had just gotten into the game in the second half when he hurt himself diving for a loose ball and played sparingly after that.

"Millard South played us very aggressive," Hook said. "We played hard, but not like we practiced."

The Patriots also used 10 points apiece from returning starters' Matt Schieber and Euvon Turner, although Ribble kept Turner on the bench for the game's first two minutes, and seven from Matt Turner.

Millard West guard Zac Robinson scored 21 of his game-high 29 points in the first half, including 14 points in the second quarter.



Unfortunately, the guys opened up with one of the top teams in the state. Millard South has three players 6'6" and above, which came into effect against the



Bench Gives Junior Jays a Boost

The starters for Omaha Creighton Prep and Millard West fought for the momentum for almost a quarter Thursday night before the Junior Jay bench grabbed it.

Jared Ruffin and Dan Povondra came off the bench and combined for 14 second-quarter points as Prep built a 15-point lead on its way to a 66-55 victory,

The Junior Jays improved to 2-2 after opening the season at a tournament in California.

The lead changed hands seven times in the first quarter before Prep went on an 11-2 run, taking a 22-14 lead on Povondra's 3-point basket 37 seconds into the second period.

Millard West cut the deficit to 24-21 before Ruffin and Povondra combined for the next 11 points. Ruffin, normally a starter, finished with 13 points and Povondra had 11. The Junior Jay lead eventually grew to 20 points before Millard West whittled it down.

"In the early part of the game, we want to wear the opponent down." said Creighton Prep Coach Reggie Morris. "In the second quarter, we have to have new guys come in. They did such a great job. They stepped right in. The bench was very, very big for us."

Millard West (1-2) made 9 of its first

18 field-goal attempts before going the final 5:42 of the second quarter without a basket.

The Wildcats committed five turnovers during that time and missed all four of their shots. Dan Bruce's free throws with 1:28 left in the half ended Prep's 12-point run.

"We're not executing on offense like we need to, yet," said Millard West Coach Rick Hook, "It's coming, but we have to get there. Really, the whole key is, had we rebounded better, we'd be right in the ballgame."


Prep owned a 36-26 rebounding advantage, with the Junior Jays grabbing 15 offensive rebounds.

Top-Ranked Southeast Rolls Past Millard West

It would be tough to find any Lincoln Southeast basketball fan who would object to moving next week's Class A boys state basketball tournament from Lincoln to Omaha Burke,

The Top 10 No. 1 Knights earned a second straight trip to the state tourney with Monday night's 94-61 rout of Millard West in the District A-2 final

And it was the third time this season that Southeast rolled over a Metro Conference opponent at the Burke

On Jan. 12, Coach Jeff Smith's Knights blasted then-No. 2 Burke 92-65 on the Bulldogs' home court. They returned Saturday night for a 62-47 win over Omaha Bryan in the A-2 semifinals.

Southeast will enter the state tournament at the Bob Devaney Sports Center in Lincoln with the Class A top seed and a 20-1 record.

The Knights shredded Millard West with 53 percent shooting (35 of 66) and a smothering defense that never let the 9-12 Wildcats get closer than 28 points in the second half.

"We told the kids they needed to work hard for 32 minutes tonight." Smith said, "and they really responded to that. We have 10 seniors on this team, and some of them should be playing more than they are, but that just shows the kind of leadership ability they have."

The Knights are three wins away from the school's first-ever state championship in boys basketball.

It took Southeast less than three minutes to build a 14-0 lead before an estimated crowd of 700. Six different players scored at least three points each as the Knights took a 26-8 lead.

Four more players scored in the

second quarter as Southeast's lead grew to 54-22 at halftime. Center Erik Kohl and forward Andrew Heckman both scored 11 points and eventually led the Knights in scoring with 18 and 16 points, respectively.

Three of the 6-foot-5 Kohl's baskets were 3-pointers from the top of the key. Smith said it's not unusual for his center to hit a 3-pointer or two, but he couldn't recall Kohl, who led the Knights with 18 points, ever making four in one game.

"He's a very versatile player," Smith said. "We didn't start him against Bryan because he was injured and didn't play in the last regular-season game. Other kids started stepping up and hitting their shots as well.

Southeast made 13 of its 29 3-point attempts, with Kohl (4 of 6) and guard Scott Wandzilak (3 of 3) leading the way. The Knights' largest lead was 37 points on three occasions in the third

Wildcats Coach Rick Hook said if Southeast continues to play as well as it did against his team, it won't be hard to figure out which team will win the state championship next week.

"If they shoot like that there's nobody in five states that can beat them," Hook said. "They're a great team, one of the best teams I've seen in a long time."

Dan Bruce led the Wildcats with a game-high 19 points.
