Seniors Ready to Make Their Mark

The 2022-23 Seniors are ready to make their mark on the Millard West Wildcat Boys Basketball program. After a season filled with injuries a year ago, West hopes to improve on last year's record.

The Wildcats have four players who started last season and a host of other players that contributed last season.

6'5" Senior Peyton Moore returns with the most points this season as he averaged 8.6 points per game last year. He shot 59.6% 2-pointers and grabbed three rebounds per game.

6'0" Senior Cole Kirschner led the Wildcats with 8.2 points per game. He made 40 3-points at a 34.5% pace. He also led the team with 32 steals and had 39 assists.

6'2" Senior Zac Grandgenett started in the first four games of the season and averaged 7.5 points per game before he broke his ankle and was not able to play the rest of the season.

5'11" Junior Max Frohloff started at point guard last year. He grabbed 3 rebounds, had 2 assists and scored 4.6 points per game.

6'3" Jaidyn Gaius-Anyaegbu came off the bench and grabbed 3 rebounds and scored 4.6 points. Cooper Fortune had 1.5 rebounds and scored 1.8 points for West. And, 6'2" Cole Butler played in half of the games last year and grabbed .8 rebounds and scored 1.1 points per game.

The Wildcats have a lot of experience returning, but they will look a little different this year. Their tallest player is 6'5 Peyton Moore. The guard-oriented team will try to play at a faster pace and will use an outside attack offensively.

"We have a lot of guards. And, at times, we can really shoot it well," said Bill Morrison. Morrison is in his 14th season as head coach of the Wildcats. "We are working on playing at a faster pace. We want to beat teams down the court for easy baskets."

"We are also working hard on our half-court defense and our rebounding," Morrison added. "We know that there will

probably be nights that we don't shoot as well. But our defense and our rebounding has to be constant."

6'0" Junior Jordan Gassen is also expected to help the Wildcats this year. Tag Carmichael, Jackson Williams, and Jacob Young will round out this year's Varsity team.

"I am looking forward to seeing how we progress throughout the year," Morrison said. "We will have to play as one unit to be competitive. We have a really tough schedule and will have to have to be on the same page to help us get some wins."

The Wildcats open at Lincoln East on Thursday, December 1st, and play at home Saturday, Dec 3, in the afternoon. The time on Saturday will depend on Thursday's day's results. West will either play Omaha Westside or Lincoln Southeast at Millard West on Saturday. The game will either be at 1:00 or 2:45.







Lincoln East Beats West in Final Seconds of Opener

The Millard West Varsity Basketball team lost close games to Lincoln East and Pre-Season #2 Westside in the first weekend. West was up for the challenge despite the fact that Seniors Jaidyn Gaius-Anyaegbu and Cole Butler were not able to play in either game due to injuries.

The Wildcats were competitive with both teams and even led through much of each game. In the end, they could not pull out the victories.

The Wildcats opened their season at Lincoln East on Thursday.

Max Frohloff led the Wildcats with 12 points and Peyton Moore gabbed 8 rebounds for West.

Carter Mick and Carter Templemeyer led the Spartans with 20 and 11 points respectively.

Both teams came out of the gate fast. Five Wildcats combined for 16 points. The two Carter's scored 10 of East's 13 points in the 1st quarter.

West led through most of the 2nd quarter. Jordan Gassen scored with 3:42 left in the half to take a 24-21 lead. Lincoln East finished the half on a 6-0 run and led 27-24 at half.

"We played very well on both sides of the ball for the first 12 minutes," Coach Bill Morrison said. "And we were still solid in the last 4 minutes. We just couldn't make a bucket."

After the break, West was able to score 21 points in the 3rd quarter. The Carter's again scored 10 of East's 12 points in the quarter. West led 45-39 going into the last 8 minutes.

Cole Kirschner made a 3-pointer to give West a 48-39 lead with 6:34 left in the quarter. A couple missed free throws and three turnovers allowed East to cut the Wildcat lead to 52-50.

West extended the lead to 53-50 on a free throw by Gassen with 2:09 left in the game. The Wildcats missed two field goals on their next two possession while the Spartans made 3 of 4 free throws to tie the score at 53-53 with 42.8 seconds left.

After a kicked ball by East, the shot clock was tuned off with 18.7 seconds left, and West was able to try to held the ball for the last shot.

Moore got trapped by two Spartan defenders and called a timeout with 11.6 seconds remaining. On the

next play, West turned the ball over with 8.8 left on the clock.

"We were going to call a timeout with just under 10 seconds left but the trap forced us to call it a little sooner than we wanted," Morrison said. "We would have also liked the ball a little higher on the sideline."

East was able to travel the distance of the court and make a lay-up. West called time out with 1.3 seconds left. A 3/4 court shot by Moore did not go in for the Wildcats.

"We probably haven't practiced enough end of the game situations. We did not execute very well in the last minute of the game," Morrison said.

#2 Westside Comes from Behind to Beat West

On Saturday, West hosted Westside in their 2nd game of the season.

Peyton Moore led the Wildcats with 9 points and 7 rebounds. Max Frohloff dished out 3 assists and Cole Kirschner recorded 4 steals for West.

Tate Odvody was the only player who scored in double digits as he scored 14 for the Warriors.

West jumped out to an early 4-0 lead and did not trail in the first half of the game. With the score tied 7-7 with 3:18 left in the quarter, Zac Grandgenett was fouled on a lay-up and suffered a game-ending injury.

The Wildcats' defense was very effective the entire game. Six different Wildcats scored in the quarter to build a 15-9 lead.

"Our defense was very good in the first half. We were able to keep them off balance by switching between Man and Zone," Morrison said. "We were able to get a lot of deflections and rebounded very well."

Westside chipped away at the lead as West had a tough time scoring in the 3rd quarter. Westside took their first lead of the game, 35-33, after a 3-pointer by Mitchell.

West scored the first two points of the 4th quarter on two free throws by Cooper Fortune with 6:14 left in the game. Cole Kirschner gave the Wildcats a 38-35 lead on a 3-pointer on the next possession. But, Maddox Anderson answered with his own 3-pointer to tie the game 38-38.

Westside build a 43-38 lead before Kirschner stole a pass at halfcourt and scored a lay-up to make the score 43-40 with 1:01 left in the game.

"We are so close, but we keep having lulls that we have to learn to overcome," Morrison said. "We will keep working and figure out a way to start winning these close games."


