Wildcats Excited for Upcoming Season



The Millard West Wildcats Boys' Basketball team has earned a pre-season Top Ten rating. The team is rated #10 by the *Omaha-World Herald* going into the 2011-2012 basketball season. The Wildcats were 8-16 last year, but have a lot of experience returning.

The Wildcats are returning their three leading scorers and seven players with varsity experience. "We had a very good off-season. I think we will have good depth this year," Coach Bill Morrison said.

Junior Connor Lusso was the team's leading scorer and rebounder averaging 16 and 7.9 in his Sophomore season. Senior Shawn Martin has earned 2 letters and started most of the season last year. He averaged 8.2 points and

shot 35% from the 3-point arc. Frankie Guido averaged 7.5 points per game and Zach Waldron averaged about 3 assists per game. Both Seniors started in some of Millard West's games last year.

Dylan Steyer, Spencer Sharp, and Josh Lallman all played quality minutes for the Wildcats as swingmen from JV to Varsity. Skyler Monaghan and Matt Wolf are expected to compete for playing time for the Wildcats.

"We have the talent to be pretty good," Morrison said. "We need to come together as a team and stay focused on our team goals." Morrison said his team has set some pretty high goals for the season. The team's versatility should help them in their attempt to reach those goals. Good team size and an inside-

outside balance should provide an exciting season for the Wildcat fans.

The team traveled to Elkhorn High and played in a pre-season scrimmage with Elkhorn High and Omaha South. The Wildcats won both halves of the scrimmage.

In the opening scrimmage, West used their rebounding and full court transition to open a big lead on Omaha South.

The 2nd half was a slower game. West had to use their half court game to overcome a physical Elkhorn team.

"Everyone is excited about the scrimmage. The coaching staff definitely saw some things we need to work on," Morrison commented. "We have a lot of potential, but I'm not sure our defense is ready for Norfolk."



Hot Second Half Carries Norfolk to Win

NORFOLK, Neb. — Preseason Top 10 No. 2 Norfolk went inside early, then relied on some torrid outside shooting to down No. 10 Millard West 75-59. The teams' season opener Friday night, part of a four-team tournament that includes Lincoln Southeast and Omaha Creighton Prep, drew a full house of 2,200. The Panthers (1-0) are to visit No. 9 Lincoln Southeast (1-0) at 6:30 p.m. Saturday in the championship game. Millard West will play for third place at Creighton Prep High School.

Norfolk got eight points early from 6-foot-7 senior Alex Starkel to build a 15-6 lead. Starkel finished with 18 points and nine rebounds. Baskets by Millard West's Connor Lusso, Spencer Sharp and Frankie Guido cut the lead to 20-16 with 6:04 left in the first half before a 13-4 run by the Panthers boosted it back to 33-20 following a basket by sophomore Taylor Reedy.

"I thought our guys got off to a fairly good start," Norfolk coach Ben Ries said. "I thought we established Alex in the paint early on, and that's something we wanted to do. Then I thought Jalen (Bradley) and (Tremain) Monroe steadied the ship in some times where we were struggling in the course of the game." Bradley finished with 24 points and Monroe 15.

The Panthers, who led 37-28 at halftime, got rolling in the third quarter. They began the second half with an 8-0 run to expand their lead to 45-28 on a floater by Bradley. The Wildcats didn't get any closer than 13 points as Norfolk built its advantage to 65-43 at the end of three quarters.

"I was really proud of our younger kids. Our inexperienced seniors made some plays," Ries said. "That really helped us get over the hump."

Ries said he was disappointed in the Panthers' play in the second quarter. "I don't think we defended very well," he said. "But Millard West has a lot of good pieces. Connor Lusso is a tremendous player, and they had other guys step up like Spencer Sharp who hurt us. We got a little tired in the second quarter after we put in a lot of energy in the first quarter. We made some silly errors. But the kids really responded after halftime and pushed it up to 18, 20 points."

Sharp led the Wildcats with 20 points. Norfolk out-rebounded Millard West 38-28 and shot 6 of 13 from 3-point range compared with 3 of 11 for the Wildcats.

"I told our guys that we had to come out the second half and get after it right away," Millard West coach Bill Morrison said. "I think Norfolk came out and scored 13 points in its first six possessions, and you're not going to beat anyone doing that."

"We did a nice job guarding Jalen early on, but our off-side help was terrible. We were coming to block everything, and he was finding the open guys or they were getting the rebounds."

Morrison said the Panthers did a good job of executing in the third quarter. "Norfolk has a really good basketball team. I knew about the three guys they had coming back, but they had some other guys step into their roles tonight."

Prep Beats Wildcats in Overtime

Two top-ten teams met at the Bird Cage for a classic Metro Conference battle. Creighton Prep jumped out to an early lead, but Millard West used their running game in the 2nd and 3rd quarter to build an 8 point lead going into the final period. Prep took a late lead and used a 22-27 performance from the line to beat the Wildcats in overtime, 68-60.

Cale Dineen took charge of the Blue Jay offense early and scored seven points for Prep in the first quarter. Prep built an 11-4 lead in the opening period while Millard West looked for their offensive flow. The Wildcats were unable to score for 7 straight possessions. Zach Waldron made a 3-pointer followed by Dylan Steyer's field goal to help West pull within two at the end of the quarter, 11-9.

Millard West turned up the defensive pressure and held Prep scoreless for the first four minutes of the 2nd quarter. Lusso scored 6 points in the quarter to lead the Wildcat full court attack. West led 23-22 going into the break. "We started playing better defense and got some easy baskets in the 2nd quarter," Coach Bill Morrison said.

The Wildcats outscored Prep 21-14 in the 3rd quarter behind Shawn Martin's 8 points in the quarter. The Wildcats biggest lead of the game was 44-33 with under a minute left in the 3rd period.

Prep was able to erase the 8-point Wildcat lead in the first 2:05 of the half as they tied the score 44-44 on a 3-pointer by Dineen. The two teams traded leads for the remaining 6 minutes of the period. With the score tied, Millard West held the ball for the last minute of the quarter and called a timeout with 13.6 seconds on the clock. The Wildcats found Lusso open on the block but turned the ball over as Prep double teamed the post. With 6.3 seconds left in the game, Dineen drove the length of the court, but missed a lay-up at the buzzer to send the game into overtime. Dineen scored 8 points for the Blue Jays.

Morrison was disappointed in his team's performance to start the 4th quarter. "We didn't make very good decisions. We had some unforced turnovers and took a couple bad shots," he said. "But we still had chances to win. They did a great job at the line tonight. That's how you win close games."

Bertolini opened the overtime with a 3-pointer for the Blue Jays. Brown made 1 of 2 free throws to give Prep a 59-55 lead. Sharp scored for the Wildcats to pull within 2 points at 59-57. Dineen made 2 free throws and Kathrein was fouled on the 2nd free throw and made 2 of 2 charity attempts. Prep led by 6 at 63-57. Lallman made a 3 pointer to keep the Wildcats alive, but Dineen made 4 of 4 free throws to end the game a give Prep a 67-60 victory.

Millard West Uses First Half to Earn First Win of Season

The Millard West Wildcats shot 59% from the field in the first half to build a 29 point lead in the first half on their way to a 70-48 victory over Omaha Burke. The Bulldogs battled in the 2nd half but were unable to cut into the lead. Shawn Martin scored 14 points for the Wildcats and Connor Lusso and Spencer Sharp added 11 points each. Trey Carr scored 9 to lead Omaha Burke.

The game started with 2 free throws due to a technical foul on the Bulldogs during warm-ups. Millard West forced 8 turnovers in the first quarter to build an early 20-7 lead. Lusso scored seven points in the first quarter for the Wildcats.

Millard West scored on the first 9 possessions of the 2nd quarter and led 42-13 late in the quarter. Omaha Burke’s two big men, Tre Hymer and Zach Oliver, both saw limited play because of foul trouble. Skyler Monaghan scored all nine of his points in the 2nd quarter. Burke used a 7-0 run to end the quarter. Millard West led 42-20 at the half.

The Wildcats built their lead back to 49-22 before the Bulldogs started to battle back. Burke went on a 13-5 run and ended the quarter down by 19, 54-35. The closes the Bulldogs would come to Millard West was 63-46 with 2:11 left in the half. The Wildcats finished the game with a 7-2 run and won by 22, 70-48.

“We didn’t start well in the first two games. We challenged the guys to come out strong in the first quarter,” Coach Bill Morrison said. “Our defense created a lot of our offense in the first half.”

Wildcats Even Record by Beating North Platte in Overtime

The Millard West boys basketball team traveled to North Platte and beat the Bulldogs 47-39 in overtime. The Wildcats scored on every possession in overtime to take control of the game. Connor Lusso scored 6 of his game high 17 points in overtime. Skyler Monaghan made 4 of 6 free throws and Josh Lallman made 2 of 2 to seal the victory for Millard West. Jack Kenny led North Platte with 15 points.

North Platte jumped out to a 6-2 lead and used a controlled offense to slow down the Wildcats who scored 70 points the night before. The Bulldogs melted off almost two minutes at the end of the quarter and finished the quarter with Kenny making a 3-pointer at the buzzer.

The second quarter was similar to the first. Millard West only had nine possessions to 10 for North Platte. Trevor Schramm led the Bulldogs with 6 first half point. North Platte led 14-15 at the half. “We did not have very many good

possessions in the first half,” Coach Bill Morrison said. “It seemed like we were on defense the whole half. We took too many quick shots.”

The 3rd quarter produced more scoring for both teams. Midway through the quarter, Millard West took a 25-24 lead on back-to-back baskets by Spencer Sharp. Kenny made two consecutive 3-pointers late in the quarter to give the Bulldogs a 20-29 lead to close the period.

Millard West took a 31-30 lead with a basket from Lusso in the first possession of the 4th quarter. Neither team could score for the next 3 minutes. North Platte scored all 5 of their points from the free throw line in the 4th quarter. With the score tied 35-35, the Wildcats held the ball for the last minute of the quarter. Shawn Martin missed a shot with 7 seconds remaining, but the Bulldogs were not able to score on the offensive end.

Millard West went to their inside

game in overtime. Lusso made 4 of 4 free throws in the first 2 possessions of the bonus period and then scored a field goal to give the Wildcats a 41-36 lead. Kenny got fouled on a jump shot and made 3 of 3 free throws to pull the Bulldogs within 2 at 41-39. Monaghan made 2 of 4 free throws while North Platte missed two field goals. The Wildcats gained the biggest lead of the game with Josh Lallman’s free throws with 1.2 seconds remaining in the game.

“That was a good win for us,” Morrison said. “North Platte has played three rated teams very close this week. They are great at controlling the tempo and really made us play their game tonight.”

Eagles Wear Down Wildcat Boys

After a competitive first quarter, Akoy Agau and No. 1 Omaha Central ran away with a 79-54 victory against No. 10 Millard West.

Coveted college prospect Agau tallied a game-high 21 points on 80 percent shooting from the field. The 6-foot-9 forward also had three huge blocks to keep the momentum on Central's side.

The blocks "change the game and stop the other team from driving to the basket," Agau said. "They really help the defense."

Connor Lusso did his best to keep Millard West in it as the junior scored a team-high 19 points, but the Wildcats' effort fell well short.

At the end of the first quarter, it seemed as if the Wildcats (2-3) would give Central a run as they trailed only 15-

11. The Eagles (6-0) quickly put an end to that, outscoring West 20-11 in the second quarter to take a 13-point lead into halftime.

The Eagles' run-and-gun style wore down Millard West. In the second half, when the Eagles shot better than 69 percent from the field due to easy fast-break buckets, they built their lead as large as 27 points.

"We want to keep the tempo up; we want to play fast," Central coach Eric Behrens said.

It's easy to play fast with players such as Darian Barrientos-Jackson, Tra-Deon Hollins and Agau on the squad.

Barrientos-Jackson finished with nine points, including two shots from behind the arc, along with three assists. Behrens complimented the senior on his leadership and ability to keep the entire team settled down and focused.

Hollins dominated on defense, forcing four steals and dishing out a game-high six assists.

Looking ahead to more difficult games can be easy for teams as they continue to succeed. While Central's closest game has been an 18-point win over Lincoln Southeast, it has its eyes set on each individual contest.

"As the No. 1 team in the state," Agau said, "we know that every team is going to give us their best shot."

Behrens agreed with his star junior player. "We're just going to go out and play every game. that's just how it's done."

Both teams have a quick turnaround as the Eagles play Saturday night at Omaha Burke and the Wildcats are home against Bellevue East.

Millard West wasted no time to bounce back from losing to the #1 team in the state. The Wildcats out-scored Bellevue East in all four quarters and won 69-42. Bellevue East was 5 of 27 from behind the 3-point arc, and Millard West out-rebounded the Chieftains 33-19. Four Wildcats scored in double figures led by Connor Lusso with 18 points. Kyle Connor led the Chieftains with 17 points and Kang Char scored 12.

West's two big men scored on their first three possessions to open up the game with a 6-0 lead. After the teams exchanged 3-pointers, the Wildcats went on a 7-0 run to lead 13-3. West led after the first quarter by a score of 15-6. A basket by Shawn Martin gave the Wildcats their biggest lead of the half at 30-13. #3 ranked Papillion-LaVista High School beat Millard West 64-57, but West lost more than a game. Evan Sharp passed away last night after an 18-month battle with brain cancer. Evan is the younger brother of starter Spencer Sharp.

The team wore orange T-shirts and orange shoe socks to honor Evan. The crowd also sported orange clothing at the game.

Spencer led the Wildcats with 12 points and 11 rebounds, but his effort was not enough to lead the team to a victory over the Monarchs. Brett Dougherty led all scorers with 25 points for Papillion, Josh Abels added 15 points on five 3-pointers, and Trey Moore added 10. Skyler Monaghan added 10 points for Millard West.

Millard West started the game in a zone and the Monarchs made them pay with five first quarter 3-pointers. The Wildcats led 4-3 early, but Papio went on an 11-0 run. Shawn Martin stopped the run with a basket, but Anthony Figueroa answered with a 3-point field goal. Josh Abels finished the scoring of the first quarter with his 4th 3-pointer of the quarter to give Papio a 20-10 lead. "We knew their 'Big 3' would score," coach Bill Morrison said. 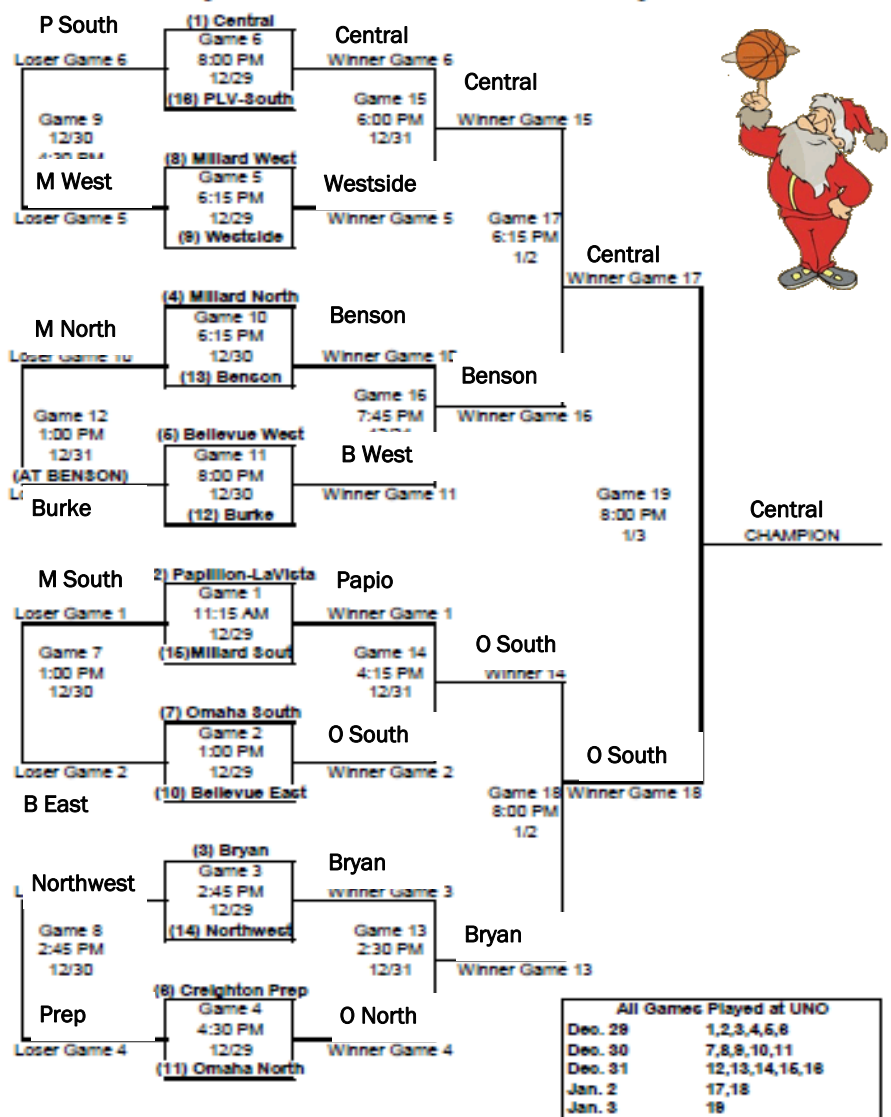
"I thought our guys had a real gutsy performance," stated Morrison. "This was a tough day for everyone in the program. I really don't know how they came out and played today."

The Wildcats led at the end of the 3rd quarter, but Papio South outscored West 17-10 in the final period to pull off the victory. Spencer Sharp scored 11 points for the Wildcats.

The first quarter had a slow start. Papio South ran a deliberate offense, but was not able to convert on many possessions. A pair of Millard West post players with a postseason run on their mind helped get the Wildcats one win from a state tournament berth Saturday night.

Lusso (17 points, eight rebounds) and Sharp (15 points, nine rebounds) combined for 10 offensive boards. "Most teams can't handle both of us down there," Lusso said. "That's our job, to get points in the paint." Lusso said the Wildcats, who lost five of eight to finish the regular season, have come together as a unit. "We've finally started playing as a team," he said.

John Harris led the Lynx with 14 points and 11 rebounds. Shaka Chol added 10 points for the Links.

After Papio opened a 36-27 lead at the half, Millard West went on an 8-2 run to start the third quarter to cut the lead to 38-35. The Monarchs answered with a 10-1 run that put the lead back to 12 at 48-36, and Papio held a comfortable lead until West's run in the fourth.

Morrison said his team did not play well enough to win. "I don't think we played poorly, but you need to be at your best to beat a good team on their home court," he said. "We thought we had a good chance coming in, but we didn't play as well as we had been playing the last few games."

The 11-13 Wildcats will graduate five seniors. "I will miss this group. It is the first group I have had all four years at Millard West," Morrison said. "I just wish we could have got them to the state tournament. They worked hard all year and really did deserve it."

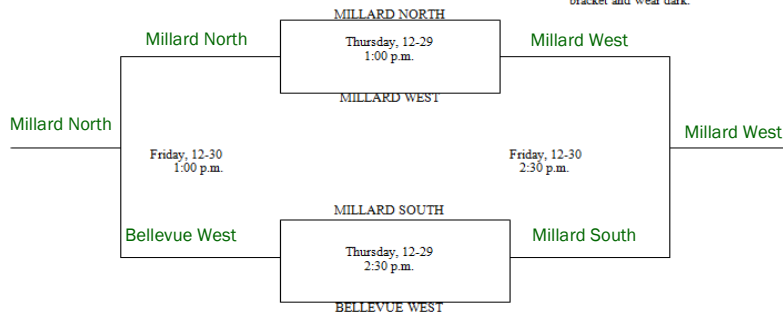

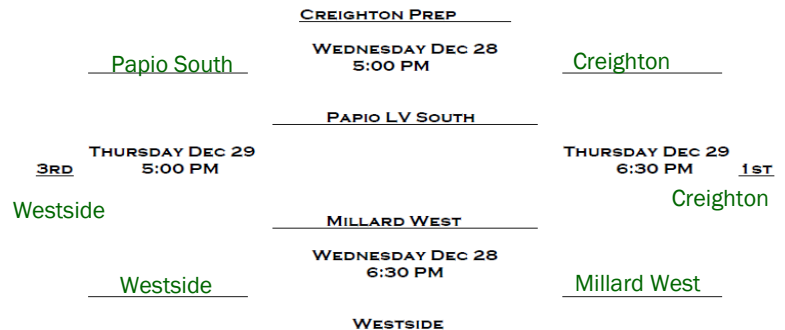

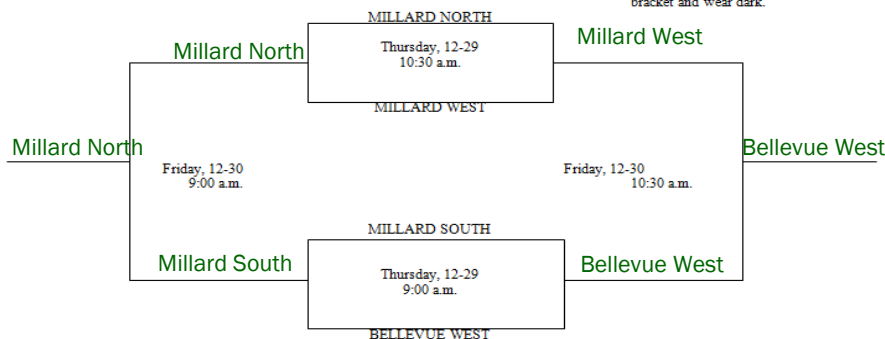


TOP TEAM IN BRACKET IS HOME AND WILL WEAR WHITE

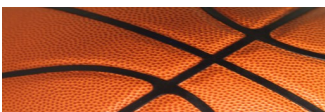

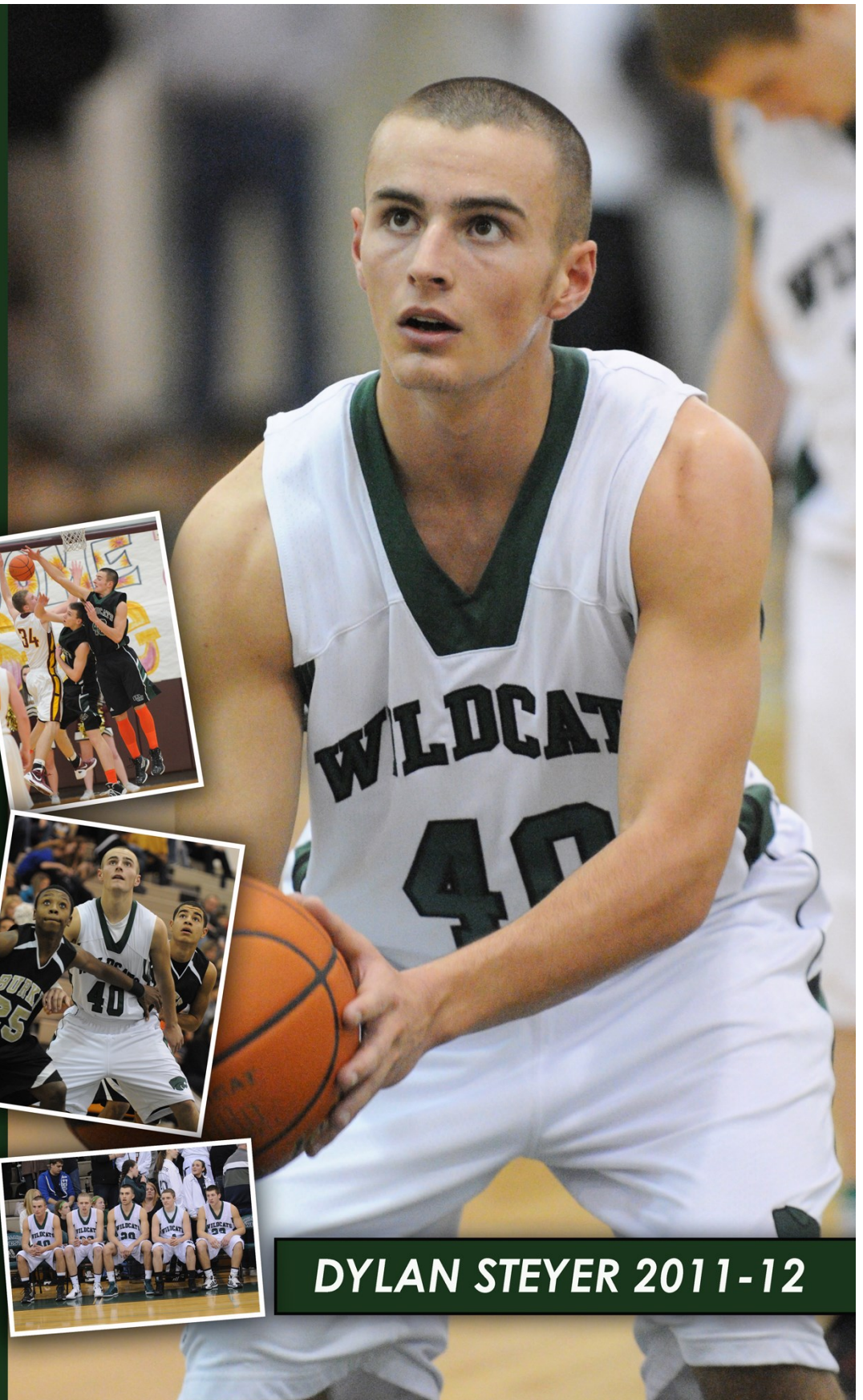
