# New Year, New Chapter, Same Expectations



The 2013-2014 Wild-cat Basketball team will be displaying some new faces this year. But Head Coach Bill Morrison says that his team has the same expectations as any other year.

"We want to be at the state tournament at the end of the season," Morrison said. "Everything we do as a team is done to help us reach that goal.

The Wildcats are coming off of an 18-8 record last year that earned the most wins of any Millard West basketball team and made a trip to the state tournament for the first time since 2003.

Joey Koca, Ben Kositz-

ke, and Adam Staashelm are the only three players that saw much playing time on last year's team.

Morrison is depending on the three returners for leadership. "We expect a lot from them. Varsity is a whole different level than JV. These guys have to set the tempo for us every day in practice."

Kositzke started every game last year for the Wildcats. He averaged 5.6 points and 5.5 rebounds per game last season. "Ben's role will be a lot different this year," Morrison commented. "He is our go-to guy on the inside. We need him to look to score more than he did last

year."

Koca started the year and earned a position in the starting line-up by the end of the season. "Joey is a tough competitor. He is probably our best defensive player. He will also have to handle most of our minutes at point this year," Morrison said. Joey averaged 3.1 points, 2.1 rebounds and 1.2 assists per game last season.

Staashelm is another player that started the

year on JV but played quality minutes for the Varsity at the end of the season. "Adam is another tough competitor. When he is back to 100% we will expect a lot out of him. The Wildcats have completed two-and-a-half weeks of practice. Morrison commented on his team's progress. "We have a very balanced team. There are a lot of guys fighting for playing time. If we handle it correctly, that balance can really help us improve as the season goes on."

There are a lot of questions and a lot of excitement surrounding this year's team. "We have a ton of potential. I am excited to see how much better we will be in March than we are right now. It will be a fun year for players and coaches!"

## Balanced attack sparks No. 6 Southeast past West

For the Class A 6th-ranked Lincoln Southeast boys basketball team this season, everybody plays and everybody finds a way to contribute.

The formula worked in the season opener Friday at Prasch Activities Center, as 10 of the 11 Knights who played scored in a 56-51 victory against West.

Coach Jeff Smith's entire 12-man varsity roster is made up of seniors. Eight Knights scored four or more points.

Smith said, "Even though Millard West made a run there at the end, our kids never panicked. We just needed to make more free throws at the end."

Southeast never trailed after the first three minutes of the game, as 5-foot-11 guard Clayton Peterson helped the Knights take a 30-20 halftime lead by scoring 10 of his game-high 14 points in that span. Peterson hit all four of his shots in the first half, including back-to-back three-pointers in a 25-second span that gave the Knights a 23-16 lead.

Peterson, finished 5-of-10 from the field and led the Knights to 50 percent shooting (23-of-46). "I got some open looks and took my shots in rhythm."

Southeast extended its lead to as many as 15 points (41-26) late in the third quarter, taking advantage of some cold shooting by the Wildcats. Millard West missed its first 20 three-point attempts before Austin Hall hit a three to cut Southeast's margin to 47-39 with 3:18 left in the game.

The Knights seemed to have things under control when Nebraska football recruit Luke Gifford (12 points) scored on a layup to increase the lead to 52-41 with 1:30 to play.

But Millard West responded with a 10-2 run, as Joey Koca and Hunter Longacre each buried three-pointers before Koca (team-high 13 points) capped it with a driving layup to make it 54-51 with 16.1 seconds left.

Peterson, however, sealed the victory with a pair of free throws with 11.5 seconds remaining to produce

the final score. Southeast was 1-of-6 at the free- throw line in the fourth period prior to Peterson's foul shots.

"We needed to hit some shots earlier," said Millard West coach Bill Morrison, whose Wildcats finished 3-of-26 from beyond the arc and 16-of-55 overall. "To miss our first 20 three-pointers and still be in it at the end against a very athletic team is pretty amazing. We had the guys we wanted shooting the ball, and we had some good looks. We just couldn't get anything to fall."

Seven different Millard West players scored in the first quarter. The Wildcats scored on 13 points on 5 consecutive possessions late in the quarter to build a 22-9 lead. Coach Bill Morrison said his team did a nice job of executing the game plan. "We wanted to come out with a lot of in-

tensity and really attack Kearney with our inside game."

Kositzke led Millard West (2-4) with 24 points and 15 rebounds. Musiel paced North Star with 16 points, and Broeker had 11.



# Pritchard Powers Prep Past Wildcats in Overtime

Tommy Pritchard got on one of the hottest second-half rolls ever in the Metro Holiday Tournament.

The Prep 5-foot-10 junior made 9 of his final 12 shots, including 5-of-7 on 3s, in scoring 29 of his seasonhigh 32 points.

His final seven points came in overtime, in which the preseason No. 9 Junior Jays outscored Millard West 20-8, for an 82-70 first-round victory Monday night at Millard South.

"He can score in flurries like that," Prep coach Josh Luedtke said. "Our guards did a good job of penetrating and pitching."

Isaiah Maxwell added 18 points, including four 3s, for Prep. The Junior Jays made a school-record 14 3s, sinking half of their attempts.

Millard West (2-5) scored the first eight points of the game and had double-digit leads in each of the first three quarters before Pritchard caught fire.

He scored on six of seven possessions — four 3s, a 3-point play and a basket — with Maxwell making two free throws in the middle as Prep went from trailing 42-30 to leading 49-48 entering the final quarter.

Most of his treys came from the right corner.

"We know the play," coach Bill Morrison said. "We over-helped a few times. Then one time in there, he got us on a back-door play."

Prep's final lead of regulation came on Pritchard's last of his six 3s for the game, with 1:53 left. Again from the right corner.

Ben Kositzke, the Wildcats' 6-7 junior, tied the game with 7 seconds left.

Pritchard nearly ended the game in regulation, with his long-range 3 going in-and-out at the buzzer.

Adam Staashelm had 22 points to

lead the Wildcats, who have less than 12 hours before playing Omaha North in a Tuesday morning consolation game.

Joey Evans and Kositzke had 16 points apiece, with Kositzke getting a game-high 15 rebounds.



Lincoln Northeast never panicked, even after seeing its seven-point lead vanish late in the fourth quarter.

After Millard West tied the A-6 boys district championship game at 36 with 1:27 remaining Monday, Northeast worked the clock down to 18.9 seconds before calling time out.

Northeast guard Payton Helmstadter then worked his way into the lane and made a soft 8-foot jumper with seven seconds to play that propelled the Rockets to a 38-36 victory that puts them into next week's state basketball tournament.

"We want to win it on our terms, our shot at the end," Northeast coach David Mercer said. "I had so much confidence in our guys to get it done."

The 12-13 Rockets unofficially will face No. 1 Omaha Benson in one of the four opening-round games at Lincoln's Pinnacle Bank Arena. Northeast will be the only school in the eight-team field with a sub-.500 record.

Helmstadter, who led all players with 15 points, admitted he was surprised he had such an easy look at the game-winning shot.

"I didn't think I'd be that wide open," Helmstadter said. "I thought it would be contested."

Millard West coach Bill Morrison said the Rockets successfully execut-

ed a pick that gave Helmstadter the wide-open shot.

"You don't want to give up that easy of a shot, but those things sometimes happen in pressure situations," Morrison said.

Northeast never trailed after taking an 8-7 lead late in the first quarter before an estimated crowd of 1,000 fans at Bellevue East. The 10-14 Wildcats trailed by nine midway through the second quarter before closing to 21-16 at halftime.

Northeast's lead was sliced to 27-25 by the end of the third quarter before an 8-3 run on three layups and a put-back gave the Rockets a 35-28 lead. Millard West responded with an 8-1 run on three layups and

two free throws.

After that, Helmstadter hit his game-winner, giving the Rockets their first state tournament berth since 2006.


