

## Pre-Season #10 Is "A Good Place to Start"



The 2014-2015 Millard West Boys Varsity basketball team is ready to begin the season this week. With six of last year's top eight players returning, the Wildcats hope to improve on the 2014-2015 record of 10-14. This year's roster is comprised of ten Seniors and three Juniors.

The **Omaha-World** Herald has placed Millard West at #10 in their pre-season ratings. "That's a good place to start," Coach Bill Morrison said. "We have a lot of experience back from last year,. If we shoot better than last year and defend well, we will have a chance to move up in the ratings. Until then, it is just a number."

The Wildcats will be tested early in the season. They could have a match up with #3 Bellevue West on Saturday and will play #2 Omaha South next week.

The Varsity team played Papillion-LaVista and Gretna High Schools Saturday night in a preseason scrimmage. The Wildcats came out on top in both exhibition halves that were played. West beat Gretna 30-20 and #7 Papillion 34-27 at Gretna High School.

"I really like our team depth," 6th year Coach Morrison stated. "We have a lot of different parts to this year's team. We can play with a lot of different combinations. We should be able to create a lot of mismatches with our depth and versatility."

The Wildcats have three starters returning from last year's line up.

6'8" center Ben Kositzke led the team in scoring(13). rebounds (7), and blocked shots (2) last season. Ben is entering is 3rd season as a starter and has been recruited by many colleges. Coach Morrison said he will be looking for Ben to become a leader on the floor and to anchor the defense. "Ben is a

really good shot-blocker. He is a really good player and has a chance to be one of the best in the state. He needs to play with a lot of energy."

Adam Staashelm is another player with three years of Varsity experience. Adam was the 8th man as a sophomore and averaged 8 ppg as a Junior. "Adam has a knack of making the big shot. He moves well without the ball and is tough to guard.

Phil Ehly rounds off the returning starters list. According to Coach Morrison, Phil is a hard worker that always seems to be in the right place. Ehly scored 5.2 points and grabbed 5.2 rebounds per game last year.

Chandler Petersen, Austin Hall, and Logan Anderjaska round out the six players that return to the team with major Varsity playing time experience. They will be joined by Seniors Mani Adams, Mike Charvat, Tyler Sharp, Westin Longacre, Max Sealer, and Caleb Conway and Junior Preston Humphrey on the Varsity team.

"We plan to take one game at a time. To win the close games this year, we are going to have to work together and know our roles. We have a lot of guys that can do a lot of different things. We have to play to our strengths," Morrison commented.

The Wildcats open their season this weekend. They will play at Kearney Friday night and will play either Bellevue West or Lincoln Southeast at Lincoln Southeast High School on Saturday.

#### Millard West Defense Clamps Down On Kearney

KEARNEY – Millard West clamped down on the defense and crushed Kearney High 52-33 Friday night in the Greater Nebraska Shootout's first round at Kearney High.

"I was very impressed with our defense. I thought we did a good job, especially for the first game," Millard West coach Bill Morrison said.

"That's something we've preached pretty hard this year because we're going to have to play good defense."

The Wildcats held Kearney to 30 percent shooting from the floor and less than that from the 3-point arc where the Bearcats took more than half their shots.

"It was a really tough shooting night," Kearney coach Scott Steinbrook said. "We're going to shoot better than that. And we're probably not going to turn the ball over 25-plus times like we did tonight.

Steinbrook chalked up part of Kearney's woes to inexperience, firstgame jitters, and emotion. Then there was Millard West's defense.

"They kind of did whatever they wanted to do. They were real physical defensively and disrupted our rhythm. They forced us into turnovers with their full court press," Steinbrook said.

Then, on offense, the Wildcats repeatedly found 6-foot-8 center Ben Kositzke down low. He finished with 17 points and 13 rebounds and made 7 of 8 free throws.

In all, Millard West shot 23 free throws to Kearney's three.

"They just pounded it. They just physically pounded us in the paint," Steinbrook said. "We said that was the No. 1 key. We had to win the battle of the paint — on the boards, getting to the foul line, defending in the post scoring in the post — and they kicked our tails."

Kearney's post players, Brian Arp and Brady Johnson, combined for five points. The rest of the points came from perimeter players led by Jake Waller with nine points — all on 3-pointers.

"We said, 'Every guy shoots the three.' We tried to extend our defense to try to make every three a tough look," Morrison said. "We had a big size advantage which also helped us in the paint. Austin Hall, who hit a pair of threes for Millard West, was the only other player in double figures, scoring 10.

## Wildcats Start Out 2-0, Beat #3 Thunderbirds

Two pre-season top ten teams met in the finals of the Greater Nebraska Shootout in Lincoln Saturday night. #10 Millard West beat #3 Bellevue West 60-57. The game was tied 54-54 with 30 seconds left when Mani Adams made four consecutive free throws for the Wildcats Bellevue West took a 22-16 lead on a basket by Daevon Harker. Ben Kositzke then took over the game for the rest of the half. Kositzke scored 13 points in the last 4:40. "Ben took his game to another level in the 2nd quarter," Morrison said. "Our guys did a great job of getting him

the ball and he wasn't going to be stopped." Bellevue West led 30-29 going into the half.

Millard West took their first lead of the game early in the third quarter on an old-fashioned 3-point plav by Ben Kositzke. The Thuderbirds forced three straight turnovers and went on a 5-0 run to regain the lead 37-35. Bellevue West scored on their last seven possessions of the 3rd quarter and took a nine point lead, 48-39.

The Wildcats

would not give up.

Adam Staashelm made a 3-pointer in transition followed by another trey by Austin Hall on an inbounds play. Logan Anderjaska got a steal and found Staashelm for another three point basket and a 48-48 tie with 6:22 left in the game.

Malik Hluchoweckyj converted on two free throws to help Bellevue West regain the lead. The Thunderbirds held the lead for the next four plus minutes of the quarter. Adam Staashlem made his third 3-pointer for the quarter to tie the game at 54-54. "They were really working on taking away Ben in the middle and we found Adam wide open," Morrison said.

The Wildcats got a stop and a rebound and worked the ball around for 36 seconds before Mani Adams found a crease in the defense and drove to the basket. Adams was fouled and made both free throws for a Millard West lead 56-54. The Wildcats stopped the Thunderbirds again. Mani Adams was fouled on a long rebound with 8.7 seconds left in the game. Adams proceeded to convert on both free throws to give Millard West a 58-54 lead.

CJ Johnson took the ball the length of the court and made a 3pointer with 3.4 seconds left. The Wildcats inbounded the ball to Tyler Sharp who made two free throws to give Millard West a 60-57. Bellevue West tried to throw the ball the length of the court and Sharp stole the pass to seal the victory.



## Millard West Big Man Displaying Big Game

Millard West coach Bill Morrison has been telling post player Ben Kositzke for a few years now that the Wildcats need him to be

the man.

The 6-foot-8, 215-pound senior has tried his best to take on a leadership role on the court. He led the Wildcats with averages of 13 points, seven rebounds and two blocks last season, despite being double-teamed down the stretch.

Then came last Saturday in the finals of the Greater Nebraska Shootout, when Kositzke arrived

in a big way.

Kositzke scored 13 points in a 4<sup>1</sup>/<sub>2</sub>minute span of the second quarter and finished with 21 as Millard West edged defending state champion — and Class A's preseason No. 3 team — Bellevue West 60-57. Morrison said that while Kositzke carried the team on his shoulders he took his game to a new level.

"Things were definitely feeling good," Kositzke said.

He felt like he couldn't miss for a while. That's not a fluke. Kositzke worked hard all summer on his inside game and also on developing a mid-range jumper while playing for the OSA Crusaders.

He's trying to be more aggressive and finish better around the rim.

Morrison said it sometimes takes

longer for post players to develop. He's watched Kositzke grow from a player who didn't make the Wildcats' top feeder team in sixth and seventh grades to a person his staff is able to be really tough on as it continues to raise the bar.

The hard-driving philosophy is all about developing confidence. Once Kositzke catches fire and grows more confi-

dent, the sky could be the limit. "We think he could get a lot better," Morrison said.

Kositzke, who has an opportunity to walk on at UNO, takes most things in stride. He plays relaxed and with a cool demeanor. Although he doesn't get worked up on the outside, underneath he's doing everything he can to win.

"We need that to come out more consistently," Morrison said.

Kositzke doesn't have to carry the entire load for the 2-0 Wildcats, not with 10 seniors on the roster. He's one of three returning starters from the squad that lost in a dis-

> trict final last year and started this season ranked 10th. Senior guard Adam Staashelm and senior forward Phil Ehly also are back.

> Ten play regularly. Although this group isn't made up of basketball junkies like Morrison had two years ago when Millard West made it to state, it does have talented multi-sport athletes who work well together and are versatile.

> Opening opponent Kearney noticed how physical they were, which Morrison said was the result of lots of work in the weight room.

> "I thought by the end of the year we'd be a top-10 team and compete for a state tournament," Morrison said. "After beating Bellevue West, and we handled Kearney pretty well, I think we're playing better than I thought we would this early."

Kositzke would love to see his team make the state tournament. There are lots of hurdles ahead, though, like Thursday night's 7:15 contest at No. 2 Omaha South (2-0).

He's expecting a good game. "We have to go in there and try to prove a point that we can beat them," he said. "It will take a lot of confidence and execution."

## **Omaha South Holds Off Late Rally by Wildcats**

Up by 19 on Millard West in the fourth guarter Thursday night. Omaha South appeared to have its third win in the bag. The Wildcats mounted frantic comeback to close within five before the Packers held on for a 65-



58 win. Second-ranked South moved its record to 3-0 and handed 10th-ranked Millard West its first loss.

"We didn't close it out the way I would have liked," Packers coach Bruce Chubick said. "But we lost our leader and we're still searching for our identity."

"This is the first game he's just had to sit and watch," Chubick said. "I know it had to be tough, but thankfully he's only a sophomore."

The visiting Wildcats were hurt by early foul trouble against 6-8 center Ben Kositzke. The senior, who entered the game averaging 19 points and 9.5 rebounds, was saddled with two fouls in the first quarter and a third just before halftime.

"He couldn't be as aggressive," Millard West coach Bill Morrison said. "That definitely was a factor in the game."

Kositzke was held scoreless in the first half as the Packers built a 28-21 halftime lead. That advantage grew to 21 in the third quarter with the help of Arop's older brother Makoor, who sank three 3-pointers.

The Wildcats trailed 52-33 early in

the fourth quarter before the tide started to turn. Kositzke, who had scored just two points, had 11 in the final period to help close the gap.

Millard West also started to heat up from behind the arc as Adam Staashelm sank a pair of 3-pointers and Tyler Sharp and Mike Charvat each had one.

The Packers also struggled from the line in the fourth quarter, missing 11 free throws, All

that combined to bring the Wildcats within 60-55 with

1:06 left after a 3point play by Mani Adams.

But South, which scored its final 10 points from the freethrow line, was able to hold on for the win.

"We tried to foul as much as we could and hope they'd miss," Morrison said. "But they made just enough to hang on."

The Packers used a balanced scoring effort, with four players

in double figures. Anthony Naimie led the way with 14, Arop had 12 and Karlon McSpadden and Caleal Walker had 10 each.

Staashelm paced the Wildcats with 15 points while Kositzke scored 13.

"East played really hard tonight. They made us work for everything we got," Coach Bill Morrison said.

Adam Staashelm scored 8 of his 19 points in the 4th quarter as the Wildcats used a 21-12 4th quarter to pull away from the Spartans.

"We were hoping our depth could wear them out," Morrison said. "I think it did, but it took longer than I thought it would.

Clay Reimers led Lincoln East with 21 points in the game. He scored 7 points in the first quarter to give the Spartans a 13-12 lead at the end of the quarter.

Reimers added eight points in the

2nd quarter. West outscored the Spartans 19-10 in the quarter. Staashelm scored nine points on three 3-pointers while five other Wildcats added two points apiece.



The starters did not play the final 13 minutes of the game, but that did not slow the Wildcats down. West outscored Bryan 14-6 in the final period.



Omaha North and Millard West, which entered the week as the two hottest teams in the Metro, meet on Saturday at Millard West.

No. 5 North (15-3) is on a 10-game winning streak — it plays winless Omaha Bryan on Friday — while No. 7 Millard West (13-3) would be working on an eightgamer should it defeat Omaha Burke (8-8) on Friday.

The focal points, obviously in the 5 p.m. game, are the big men for both teams – 6-foot-10 Justin Patton for North and 6-7 Ben Kositzke of Millard West.

It gets no easier for the Wildcats, either. They have a Tuesday game at No. 4 Omaha Creighton Prep.



On a team that's adept at finishing around the

rim, coach Jared Andersen knows just how valuable sophomore Anthony Laravie is to Omaha North.

"That's a dimension that I can't even put into words how important he is. When he's shooting the ball well, our scores are very, very high," Andersen said. "

Laravie's long-range shooting made the difference Saturday. He hit four 3-pointers in the first five minutes of the second half, helping the fifth-ranked Vikings regain control on their way to a 66-57 win over No. 7 Millard West.

Laravie finished 6 of 7 from 3point range, scoring a team-high 18 points.

"We look to drive. We really don't look to shoot 3s. But when he's open, he's going to pull it," said North senior Justin Patton, the Creighton pledge who finished with 11 points, four rebounds and five blocks.

The victory stretched the Vikings' winning streak to 12 games — they haven't lost since Dec. 31 against Omaha Creighton Prep. Millard West saw its eight-game winning streak snapped.

Laravie wasn't alone in knocking down 3-pointers. North went 10 of 14 from behind the arc.

But the Wildcats, who still trailed by 15 early in the second quarter, scored 13 straight points in the middle part of the quarter to grab a 28-27 lead with 2:42 left in the half.

Millard West went 9 of 12 from the field in the second quarter but hit 9 of 28 after halftime.

The Wildcats were coming off a triple-overtime win over Omaha Burke Friday night. Morrison said he didn't think that factored into Saturday's outcome.

"I'm sure we were a little tired, but once the game starts, I think that goes away," he said. "I thought we battled."

Andersen said the way senior Tre Ammons battled for North on the glass also was a huge boost Saturday. Ammons finished with eight points and a game-high 10 rebounds.

He had five points and three boards in the fourth quarter.

"That was a great boost," Andersen said. "That kid is nothing but energy. Whenever he gets a chance to be in there, he leaves nothing on the court."

Kositzke, after going scoreless in the first quarter, led Millard West with 21 points and seven rebounds. Logan Anderjaska added 10 points, all in the second quarter.

## Wildcats Shoot Down Monarch Senior Night

So this is how things turn out when Millard West plays four complete quarters.

The Top 10 No. 8 Wildcats (16-5) made two of every three shots, allowed Papillion-La Vista precious few second chances and shortcircuited Monarch rallies with baskets at crucial points Tuesday for a 60-44 Metro Conference boys basketball victory.



Millard West made 22 of its 33 field-goal attempts (.667) and took only six 3-point shots. After building a 10-point lead by halftime, the Wild-cats let the Monarchs get no closer than three points in the second half.

With junior forward Logan Anderjaska leading a balanced attack — he scored 13 points while three teammates each finished with nine — Millard West did most of its damage with layups.

Wildcats coach Bill Morrison said there have been games where Millard West has played two or three quarters that well. This was the first time the Wildcats have played this well the entire game.

"We have showed at times we can play like this, but we haven't put 32 minutes together," Morrison said. "The offense was moving well, and Papillion always plays hard, so we had to match or beat their intensity."

The Wildcats slowly wore down and eventually frustrated the Class A No. 9 Monarchs (13-8) before an estimated crowd of 1,000 at Papillion.

After the first quarter, in which the teams combined to make 9 of 14 shots and were tied 10-10, Millard West picked up its defensive intensity and created a cushion that would carry it through the rest of the game.

Seven of West's eight baskets in the second quarter were layups, including two apiece by Mani Adams and Anderjaska. Those highpercentage shots helped the Wildcats build a 12-point lead that eventually led to a 29-19 halftime advantage.

"I felt lucky we were only down 10 at halftime," Monarchs coach Dan

Moore said. "We were a little off, actually a little more than off. In the first half, they (Millard West) were more aggressive and we weren't driving to the rim."

Taking it to the hoop instead of settling for short jumpers Tuesday night cleared the path for Millard West to return to the Class A state basketball tournament.



Mani Adams and Benjamin Kositzke each scored 10 points to lead the Wildcats to a 51-29 victory over Lincoln Southeast in the championship game of the District A-6 tourna-

ment before an estimated 1,100 at Millard West.

It gives the Wildcats their second state tournament berth in three years and fifth overall.

The Wildcats bounced back and finished the quarter with a 7-1 run that gave them a 14-9 lead.

Both teams went ice cold at the start of the second quarter. There was only one field goal apiece in the first five minutes before Adam Staashelm made a layup with 2:56 to go before halftime to put West ahead 18-11.

The third quarter also got off to a cool start as neither team was able to score in the first 2:30. Things picked up

in the final minute, and Chandler Petersen put in a follow shot with one second to go to give the Wildcats a 34-26 lead heading into the fourth quarter.

Millard West took over from there, outscoring the Knights 17-3 in the final eight minutes and not allowing a field goal.

Morrison said with such a wide-open Class A field, he likes the Wildcats' chances if they continue to play defense the way they have the past few weeks. Southeast was the fourth out of five opponent the Wildcats have held to fewer than 40 points.

"I think that's why we have a good chance at state," Morrison said. "It's whoever is playing best next week. I like our chances."

OMAHA — Lincoln Southeast looked on the verge of another upset and a possible state tournament berth Tuesday when the Knights cut Millard West's lead to five points with 2:50 left in the third quarter.

But upset stomachs and Millard West altered those hopes with a sprint to the finish of a 51-29 victory in the Class A-6 district final at Millard West.

Southeast was missing starting point guard Brady McDonald, and a few other players were limited by food poisoning, Southeast coach Jeff Smith said.

"We had to change things up and we did OK for a while, but Millard West just ran away from us in the end," he said.

"Millard West is a really good team and they deserved this and we have no excuses."

The Wildcats (19-5) outscored Southeast 18-3 in the final 8:01 of

"We got there with a lot of effort and then just kind of lost our legs," said Smith, whose team stunned Lincoln High, the top-seeded team in the district, Saturday night. Millard West gave up a threepoint basket by Jace Anderson with 31 seconds left in the third quarter and didn't allow the Knights to score again until Anderson hit two free throws with 2:40 left in the game. Southeast (7-18) scored just three points in the fourth quarter.

"We thought we were going to get T-shirts that said 'Back to the Bank' with another trip to Pinnacle Bank Arena this year," said Southeast junior guard Trevor Dockum. "We had to move some people around because of the sickness and we still hung in there. But Millard West took over inside and we couldn't get going again."

The Wildcats counted on a couple of blocked shots by 6-foot-8 senior Ben Kositzke to stop to Knight drives and turn those into breakaway layups by Mani Adams, who had five steals and scored on five drives to the basket in the game.

"We started to attack and we all wanted to play better defense," said Adams. "With this kind of defense, we think we can beat anybody."

Millard West coach Bill Morrison agreed.

"We have been playing some great defense and held our last four opponents to under 40 points," he said. "I think that's why we have a good chance at state. There isn't a clear cut favorite, but if I had to bet, I'd bet on us."






