With only 9 points and 5.6 rebounds returning from last year's team, the 2018-2019 Wildcat Basketball team is asking themselves, "What Does It Take?"

The Wildcats started five Seniors and played a 6th off the bench last year. But don't count them out.

"We have enough experience that we won't be shell-shocked when we go into our first game," Coach Bill Morrison said. "And, this group has been very successful the last two years on our lower level teams."

The Millard West JV teams put together two of their best years in school history. Two years ago, the JV team won 17 games, and last year's JV team only lost two games.

Jacob Harmdierks and Cam Watson are the only two Seniors on this year's team. "We will count on them for leadership. They are both hard workers. We want them to help increase our intensity level," Morrison said.

The Wildcats open their season at preseason Class B #1 Lincoln Pius on Thursday. They will play their 2nd game at home on Saturday, Dec. 1, at 2:45 against either Lincoln East or Fremont High.

The Wildcats hope to be a contender for the state tournament at the end of the season. "We just need to concentrate on getting better every day," Morrison said.





Thunderbolts Strike Early in Season Opener

Pre-Season #8, Lincoln Pius jumped out to an early 11-2 lead and went on to beat Millard West 68-54 in both teams season opener.

Charlie Easley led Pius with 25 points and 6 rebounds. Austin Jablonski added 12 points and 9 rebounds, while Kolbe Rada scored 11 points.

Zach Olson led the Wildcats with 14 points. Nate Glantz and Evan Meyersick added 11 and 10 points respectively.

Pius opened the game with back to back 3-pointers to start the game. After extending an 11-2 lead in the first 4 minutes, Millard West settled down and made a run to get back in the game.

Olson and Cam Watson each hit a 3 pointer and Peyton Buscher scored four points to pull the Wildcats to 14-16 at the end of the first quarter.

The 2nd quarter started much like the 1st quarter did for Pius. The Thunderbolts scored on 7 of their first 9 possessions to build a 31-19 lead. West fought back the rest of the quarter and trailed 27-38 going into the half.

"They killed us on the boards," Coach Morrison said. "We didn't seem to get many rebounds in the first half. Really the whole game." Pius scored nine second chance points in the half.

West was the team that started out fast in the 3rd quarter. Meyersick scored 4 points for the Wildcats as they went on an 8-2 run and pulled within six points 35-41.



After a timeout with 4:05 left in the quarter, Pius ran off eight straight points and regained their double digit lead. Pius led 49-37 going into the final period.

Pius started out quick again in the 4th quarter. They extended their lead to 20 points on a put-back off an offensive rebound by Rada with just over 5 minutes left in the game.

"We gave up too many runs to stay with them. Our defense wasn't terrible, but they seemed to capitalize on every mistake and loose ball., Morrison said. "And they were relentless on the boards."

Pius outrebounded the Wildcats 36 -22 on the night.

Both teams will play at Millard West on Saturday. Pius will play Lincoln East at 1:00 and West will play Fremont at 2:45.

Dalys Beanum helped the Wildcats jump out to an early 12-2 lead in Saturday's game. Lincoln Southwest cut it to 44-41 late in the game, but West held on for a 46-41 win.

Kaedyn Odermann led the Wildcats with 17 points in his first career start for West. Evan Meyersick added 12 points to the winning cause. Michael McCroy was the only Husky in double digits with 11 points.

Northwest led 8-7 midway through the first quarter. Cam Watson was fouled on a lay up and converted the three-point play. Then Jacob Harmdierks added a basket and Odermann made a couple free throws to end the quarter on 7-0 run and take a 14-8 lead into the break.

West extended their lead to 22-13, but Northwest answered with 9 points on 4 possessions to tie the score. Meyersick scored two buckets and Aabid Sidiqi added a couple free throws to give the Wildcats a 28-22 lead. The half ended with a last second three-pointer by Meyersick on a

Omaha Creighton Prep coach Josh Luedtke preaches optimum effort, and his seventh-ranked Junior Jays showed it often enough Tuesday night to post a 59-50 Metro Conference basketball victory over Millard West.

There were moments when Luedtke hoped things might go a bit better — times when the Wildcats would quickly cut into a lead the Junior Jays had just built — but he also understands that maximum focus can be difficult to have in a midweek game.

"Millard West is never going to quit, and we knew they weren't going to quit on us," Prep coach Josh Luedtke said. "Overall it seemed like a typical Tuesday night game. It lacked some energy, but overall I thought we did all right."

Prep went on its first big run early in the second quarter after the opening eight minutes ended with the teams tied at 12. Back-to-back slam dunks by Nebraska recruit Akol Arop and a layup by Robert Peters in the first 1:05 gave Prep an 18-12 lead.

Class A No. 9 Millard West quickly trimmed its deficit to one before Prep bounced back to build a 31-24 halftime lead.

The new-look Wildcats — all five of their starters from the 2017-18 season were seniors — have jelled into a tight unit that, while young, is one of Class A's most improved squads.

"Our defense is pretty good, and it really wasn't too bad tonight," Wildcats coach Bill Morrison said. "They're such a tough guard because you have to pay attention to Arop, and they've got multiple guys who can shoot. When we got tired, we started making some mistakes."

Turnovers hurt the 7-7 Wildcats, especially in the second half. The third quarter basically was a draw — the Junior Jays added one point to their halftime lead to take a 44-36 lead — before Prep more than doubled that advantage with a 13-3 run to open the fourth quarter.

Though it was a low-scoring affair, Luedtke said, the team met one of the goals it sets for each game.

"We always preach about trying to get five guys into double figures, and we were able to do that tonight," Luedtke said.

Millard West committed 17 turnovers, including six in the fourth quarter, while Prep turned the ball over just four times.

"We have come a long way and we have a lot of different choices this season," Morrison said. "But at the same time we have to get better mentally. I still don't think we're close to our potential. When one mistake happens,

we tend to make a second mistake."

Because of some postponements earlier in the season, the Wildcats have kicked off a stretch of eight games in the final three weeks of the season. The next four are against teams with sub-.500 records, but the final three are against Class A No. 10 Papillion-La Vista South, Lincoln North Star and Top 10 No. 3 Kearney.

"Our guys have plenty of fight," Morrison said. "It's good to know we still have three weeks, and we're going to have to beat a team like them if we want to do anything at the end of the season."


