## Wildcats Re-acquire Ownership Rights to Q-Street

The Millard West Boys Basketball Team used a strong defensive effort to run past cross-town rival Millard South. The Wildcats outscored the Patriots 31 to 15 in the 2nd half to secure the 61-42 victory.

Evan Meyer was the only player on either team in double digits for the

night with 16 points.

Tristan Gomes helped the Wildcats get off to an early lead. He scored 5 points early in the quarter. A 3-pointer by Zach Olson gave West an early 8-3 lead.

Late in the quarter, The Patriots were able to put together a 6-0 run

and take a 14-12 lead with 1:24 left in the quarter. A basket by Kaedyn Odermann before Meyersick was fouled on a shot and converted the ensuing free throw gave West a 17-14 lead at the end of the first quarter.

The scoring picked up for both teams early in the 2nd quarter. West gained a 26-21 lead on another basket by Meyersick after an offensive rebound with less than 40 seconds left in the half.

Two free throws by Meyersick gave the Wildcats a six point lead, but a 3pointer by Jack Cooper at the buzzer made the score 30-27 at the half.

"I thought we played really well offensively in the first half," Coach Bill Morrison said. "We let them drive the ball into the paint a little too much and they made their shots to keep it close."

West came out of the half more aggressive on offense in the 2nd half. They were fouled shooting on two of their first four possessions and extended their lead to 34-27 with 6:19 re-

maining in the 3rd quarter.

West then switched to a 1-3-1 zone defense and made it tough for the Patriots to get good shots.

"We put our 3 bigs in and went to a zone," Morrison said. "We have been working on it because we wanted to be able to play Gomes, Meyersick, and Odermann at the same time. It worked pretty well tonight."

South only scored 2 points in the 3rd quarter as West extended their lead to 45-29 going into the 4th quarter.

"We wanted to stay aggressive, but manage the clock at the same time in the 4th quarter. We knew they wouldn't quit," Morrison said.

West started the 4th quarter with two turnovers . Two South 3-pointers cut the lead to 47-35 before West took control of the game. The Wildcats scored on eight consecutive possessions including 6 of 6 from the line.

"The West-South game is always a great atmosphere. I was worried that we were a little too excited, but the guy played really hard and still executed the game plan," Morrison said.

"This was probably the best we prepared for a team. We need to

take that into the last two weeks of the season and post season," commented Morrison. "When we heard them call a play, we took it away. I thought it was a big step for our team tonight."

#### **#7 Prep Fends of Challenge From Young #9 Wildcats Team**

Omaha Creighton Prep coach Josh Luedtke preaches optimum effort, and his seventh-ranked Junior Jays showed it often enough Tuesday night to post a 59-50 Metro Conference basketball victory over Millard West.

There were moments when Luedtke hoped things might go a bit better — times when the Wildcats would quickly cut into a lead the Junior Jays had just built — but he also understands that maximum focus can be difficult to have in a midweek game.

"Millard West is never going to quit, and we knew they weren't going to quit on us," Prep coach Josh Luedtke said. "Overall it seemed like a typical Tuesday night game. It lacked some energy, but overall I thought we did all right."

Prep went on its first big run early in the second quarter after the opening eight minutes ended with the teams tied at 12. Back-to-back slam dunks by Nebraska recruit Akol Arop and a layup by Robert Peters in the first 1:05 gave Prep an 18-12 lead.

Class A No. 9 Millard West quickly trimmed its deficit to one before Prep bounced back to build a 31-24 halftime lead.

The new-look Wildcats — all five of their starters from the 2017-18 season were seniors — have jelled into a tight unit that, while young, is one of Class A's most improved squads.

"Our defense is pretty good, and it really wasn't too bad tonight," Wildcats coach Bill Morrison said. "They're such a tough guard because you have to pay attention to Arop, and they've got multiple guys who can shoot. When we got tired, we started making some mistakes."

Turnovers hurt the 7-7 Wildcats, especially in the second half. The third quarter basically was a draw — the Junior Jays added one point to their halftime lead to take a 44-36 lead — before Prep more than doubled that advantage with a 13-3 run to open the fourth quarter.

Arop and CJ Wolfe, who led all scorers with 13 points apiece, scored all but two of Prep's points in that run. Wolfe also led all players with 11 rebounds.

Though it was a low-scoring affair, Luedtke said, the team met one of the goals it sets for each game.

"We always preach about trying to get five guys into double figures, and we were able to do that tonight," Luedtke said. "We've got to have great effort and great focus. I think we do it at times, but we have to do it for 32 minutes. We've got to get ready to go."

Spencer Schomers scored 11 points and both Thomas Faber and Peters chipped in 10 for Prep. Senior guard Cam Watson led the Wildcats with 11 points and seven rebounds.

Millard West committed 17 turnovers, including six in the fourth quarter, while Prep turned the ball over just four times.

"We have come a long way and we have a lot of different choices this season," Morrison said. "But at the same time we have to get better mentally. I still don't think we're close to our potential. When one mistake happens, we tend to make a second mistake."

Because of some postponements earlier in the season, the Wildcats have kicked off a stretch of eight games in the final three weeks of the season. The next four are against teams with sub-.500 records, but the final three are against Class A No. 10 Papillion-La Vista South, Lincoln North Star and Top 10 No. 3 Kearney.

"Our guys have plenty of fight," Morrison said. "It's good to know we still have three weeks, and we're going to have to beat a team like them if we want to do anything at the end of the season."

"I was really impressed with the way our team started out defensively. Northeast runs a match up zone that haven't we seen, and we had trouble settling in on offense." Coach Bill Morrison said. "But our defense never let up."

West did a line change at the 4 minute

mark and switched to man-to-man defense. The Wildcats led 11-2 at the end of the first quarter.

"Our 5-man substitution in the first quarter was planned," Morrison said. "It was our 3rd game of the week and we wanted to keep our energy level up by playing everyone."

West's defense forced seven turnovers in the 2nd quarter, including five on the first six possession of the quarter as they built a 16-2 lead with 5:47 left in the half.

West was only able to score twice on their last nine possessions. A three pointer by Carson Busch as the time ran out made the score 20-7 at the half.

"We thought our zone would give them problems, but we wanted to put more pressure on them and try to speed the tempo up in the 2nd half," Morrison said.

The plan worked. The Wildcats forced three more turnovers early in the 3rd quarter and scored on their first six possession to open up a 31-10 lead. West led 45-19 at the end of the quarter.

The Cats stayed aggressive and scored on seven straight possessions to open the final period and extend their lead to 61-26.

"Our defense was really solid this weekend. "We held the other points to 2 points in two different quarters, and held Northeast to just 7 points in the first half," Morrison said.

"We think our defense is what we need to hang our hat on," Morrison added. "This team plays hard and are really starting to gel. It's a good time to do that."
